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# GENERAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM

General Education, as a programme of study, aims to provide students with a foundation in acquiring knowledge, skills, values, and mind-set to equip them for the challenges of university studies and beyond. It also serves as preparation for academic pursuit in a specialised area of study at the undergraduate or graduate levels. Such preparation includes analytical, critical, and creative thinking, as well as the motivation to learn and an open mind to explore new concepts, beliefs, and knowledge. At EdUHK, the General Education programme offers a variety of courses with a broad range of subject areas and disciplines. The programme has been designed with an integrated structure crossing over the Foundation, Breadth and Consolidation levels. Students are required to participate and complete the General Education Foundation Course, then select some General Education Breadth Courses for further studies, and finalise the General Education programme with the General Education Consolidation Course.

Students are strongly encouraged to visit the website for more details of the General Education programme, the variety of courses, and their corresponding learning outcomes. It is also recommended that students should be familiarised with the General Education Learning Outcomes (GELOs). These outcomes stipulate the overall objectives of the General Education programme across students' entire study at EdUHK.

#### **General Education Breadth Courses**

For cohort 2016/17 and thereafter:

- Strand 1: Persons, Interpretations, Perspectives
- Strand 2: Community, Society, Culture
- Strand 3: Nature, Science, Technology
- Strand 4: Positive and Values Education
  - 12 credit points
  - ➤ Take 4 General Education Breadth Courses (3 credit points each) with 1 course from each strand
  - Normally taken upon the completion of the General Education Foundation Course
  - Students are also allowed to take the General Education Foundation Course and the General Education Breadth Courses concurrently in Semester 2 (Year 1) if they are interested and their curriculum schedule allows.
  - Year 1 students who have been granted credit transfer

for the General Education Foundation Course (due to change of programme within EdUHK) can start taking GEBCs in Semester 1 (Year 1).

- Unless specified by individual hosting departments, courses contained in the course offering list in each semester are open for students' selection provided there is no time clash with other registered courses.
- Medium of Instruction: English/ Chinese

#### **General Education Consolidation Course**

- 3 credit points
- Compulsory
- To be taken after completion of all General Education Breadth Courses required or concurrently with the fourth (i.e. last) General Education Breadth Course
- Students have to take the General Education Consolidation Course in the year of study assigned by individual programmes.
- Medium of Instruction: English

#### Remarks:

Students have to keep all learning artefacts/ documents/ records for the construction of ePortfolios throughout their undergraduate studies.

# ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENT FOR GENERAL EDUCATION COURSES

According to the General Academic Regulations of the Student Handbook

(Chapter 4.1

http://www.eduhk.hk/reg/student handbook/main.html#),

Point 13. Leave of Absence

"13.3 Where necessary, individual courses/ course lecturers/ programmes/ departments may specify their attendance requirements."

Students are expected to follow the General Academic Regulations and to attend every scheduled session of a course. A standard attendance requirement is now set up across the General Education courses (including the General Education Foundation Course, the General Education Breadth Courses and the General Education Consolidation Course), the minimum attendance requirement is 80%. Under special circumstances, students who are absent from a prolonged period, or for more than the 20% of contact time allowed must seek approval from

the Course Instructor and Programme Leader/ Coordinator prior to taking the leave. Students who are absent from a prolonged period in a course without prior permission will be given a grade F (Fail) by their course lecturers/ tutors. The grade F will be recorded on the students' transcripts.



#### Attendance Policy for the General Education

#### **Foundation Course**

Students are <u>required</u> to attend both lectures and tutorials weekly. Students' attendance in lectures would be recorded electronically via their student ID cards. For the tutorials, tutors would monitor the attendance and students would be penalized in the final grade for their poor attendance. Students should contact their tutors if they are absent from any tutorials.

If students are not able to attend any lecture/ tutorial due to the following circumstances, they are required to submit a Leave Application Form to General Education Office/ their tutors.

## **PLAGIARISM**

According to the General Academic Regulations of the Student Handbook

(Chapter 8

http://www.eduhk.hk/reg/student handbook/main.html#),

Point 4. Plagiarism

"This is not just confined to copying another's words, sentences and/ or paragraphs, but also means borrowing another's idea, concept or argument without proper acknowledgment. It is a serious academic offence in the intellectual world as it stifles creativity and originality, whilst denying you the opportunity of learning from your work. There is zero tolerance for plagiarism at any level at the University as clearly spelt out in the Policy. Even if you just copy a phrase or sentence, or borrow an idea and/ or concept without proper referencing, you have already committed plagiarism, an academic theft similar to stealing. You should avoid it at all costs. Also, it does not matter what the nature of the source is. It may be a book, a magazine, a newspaper article, a table or passage from the internet, or simply a course work of another student or even teaching material distributed by your course teachers.

The most obvious form of plagiarism is direct copying without referencing. Modifying the way the author expresses his idea and passing this off as your own, that is, paraphrasing the author's idea, is another form of plagiarism though it is less explicit. Students, however, often fall prey to this form of plagiarism. Other forms may include borrowing the work of others by attaching one's name to it or the indirect borrowing of work from a secondary source cited in the original source without properly acknowledging both sources. The following example may help you to grasp the meaning more thoroughly:

In Hong Kong, women are expected to live longer than men.

(This fact has been widely known to Hong Kong people, so it is already common knowledge and there is no need to acknowledge the source.)

In Hong Kong, women outlive men. According to the statistics of the Centre for Health Protection in 2015, the average life expectancy of women is 87.3 years while that for men is only 81.4 years.

(When you give exact figures, unless you are the source provider, you have to acknowledge the source. If you don't do so, you commit plagiarism!)"

# GENERAL EDUCATION FOUNDATION COURSE

The General Education Foundation Course is a 3-credit point course that will run in Semester 2 and be taken by all first year students at EdUHK. This course will introduce students to a selection of major themes and topics in General Education. The purpose of the course is to equip and motivate students to think carefully about a broad range of issues, construct and attain knowledge, and apply what they have learned to their own lives. This course will also highlight the complexities of ideologies and the persistence of various ideological tensions in the world. Different perspectives on the various topics of General Education will be emphasized. Through explanations and demonstrations provided, students will be inspired to participate as active thinkers in the disciplines and traditions of thought that constitute knowledge and understanding. As a unique feature of the course, eJournals will be submitted by students after lectures and become an important part of the ePortfolio. This exercise will encourage them to reflect and think critically on various topics.

Classes of the General Education Foundation Course will be composed of weekly lectures and tutorials.

## The General Education Foundation Course lectures (2 hours per week)

The lectures will be given by eminent scholars and practitioners who will introduce students to a range of disciplines and topics across different knowledge domains. In addition to face-to-face lectures, video lectures will be arranged as appropriate. For the video lecture weeks, students will not be required to attend the face-to-face tutorials. Instead, students are strongly encouraged to watch video(s), read supplementary resources, complete the online exercises and take part in discussion forum which is based on the suggested inquiry questions.

# The General Education Foundation Course tutorials\* (2 hours per week)

The tutorials will be small-class environments in which students sharpen their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills, and learn to think critically about the issues presented in the lectures. These activities will enable students to develop a deeper understanding of the course content, and to construct and reflect on their own interpretations of that content. Students interact

with tutors on a regular basis and they will be trained to improve their communication skills and nurture tolerant, critical but constructive attitudes towards various academic arguments and debates.

#### Remarks:

\*The General Education Foundation Course tutorials will be held on Tai Po Campus and at Tseung Kwan O Study Centre, students have to take the tutorials on either campus as assigned.

# GENERAL EDUCATION BREADTH COURSES

With about 160 electives covering a wide variety of topics, the General Education Breadth Courses will extend students' intellectual perspectives by inviting them to explore more focused topics across major fields of knowledge; specifically: arts and humanities, social sciences, science and technology, and positive and values education. They are categorized into four strands, namely,

Strand 2	(Course Code: GEG)

Students will have to take four General Education Breadth Courses (3 credit points each) with one course from each strand. The General Education Breadth Courses are normally taken upon the completion of the General Education Foundation Course. Students are also allowed to take the General Education Foundation Course and the General Education Breadth Courses concurrently in Semester 2 (Year 1) if they are interested and their curriculum schedule allows.

#### 1. Taking General Education Breadth Courses as Electives

According to the University's policy, all 4-year FT BA/ BSocSc/BME/ BScEd/ BSocScEd and 5-year FT BEds students are eligible to select the General Education Breadth Courses (GEF/ GEG/GEH/ GEK) as electives.

Students who wish to register extra General Education Breadth Course(s) as elective(s) or free choice(s) should contact and notify their Programme Offices after successful registration of the course(s).

# 2. Drop or Withdraw General Education Breadth Courses after the Add/ Drop Period

According to the General Academic Regulations of the Student Handbook

(Chapter 4.1

http://www.eduhk.hk/reg/student handbook/text en4 1b.html#4),

#### Point 4. Course Enrolment

"4.3 Students can add or drop a course during the add/ drop period or before the third class meeting. Students are permitted to drop a course after the add/ drop period but before the examination period or the deadline for submission of final assignments, whichever applicable, only for strong personal reason(s), such as serious illnesses; the grade W (Withdrawn) will be recorded on the students' transcripts."

and

"4.4 Failure to attend a course does not automatically result in the course being dropped. Students who are reported for prolonged absence in a course without permission will be accorded a grade F (Fail) for the course."

According to the regulations, adding or dropping a General Education Breadth Course after the add/ drop period will NOT be allowed. Students are permitted to withdraw the course after the add/ drop period (before the examination period) only if they have strong personal reasons. These reasons include serious illnesses or other special reasons indicating that the students are unable to continue their study for a prolonged period. In this case, students are also required to get the approval from the Course

Instructor and Programme Leader/ Coordinator by email or application form (if applicable). The grade W (Withdrawn) will be recorded on the transcripts for successful applicants. For any student who is reported for prolonged absence without any strong personal reason, a grade F (Fail) will be accorded for the course.

To maintain fairness and consistency in practice, General Education Office will strictly follow the above regulations and no special approval will be given to students without strong personal reasons as stated in the Student Handbook. As a friendly reminder, please also note that there is NO paper form for adding or dropping the General Education Breadth Courses. Students MUST add or drop the General Education Breadth Courses through the online platform during add/ drop period.

## Strand 1 (GEF): Persons, Interpretations, Perspectives

#### **Course synopsis**

- Focus on human persons as individuals;
- Aim at generating new understandings and interpretations, often of a personal or narrative nature, rather than the impersonal accumulation of factual and theoretical knowledge;
- Use more particularistic and accessible methods, such as literary analysis and criticism, case studies, semantics and conceptual analysis relating to specific individuals, events and situations;
- More concerned with specifics (individuality) than patterns or generality;
- Embrace issues to do with values and evaluation;
- Examples of Strand 1 disciplines: language and literature, history, media studies, philosophy, ethics, aesthetics, fine arts, music and drama.

## Strand 2 (GEG): Community, Society, Culture

#### **Course synopsis**

- Focus on aspects of human society, culture and interaction;
- Aim at generating both new knowledge and understanding concerning how people function together;
- Use a combination of methods, including qualitative and quantitative;
- More concerned with "limited" generalities and patterns (interpersonal relationships) than either strict scientific generalities or specific narratives;
- Examples of Strand 2 disciplines: anthropology, archaeology, economics, environmental studies, history, linguistics, political science, law, international studies, psychology and education.

- Use more general, technical methods, such as empirical testing, experimentation and quantitative research;
- More concerned with law-like generalities than specifics;
- Examples of Strand 3 disciplines: physics, chemistry, biology, physiology, astronomy, neurology, aspects of geography, meteorology, geology, environmental science, statistics, applied mathematics and computer technology.

# Strand 4 (GEK): Positive and Values Education

#### **Course synopsis**

- Focus on human being's values towards positiveness (e.g. resilience, hope, gratitude, zest, perseverance, multiperspective thinking, self-regulation, and etc.), character strengths, and well-being;
- Aim at generating understandings on enhancing individual and collective well-being through self-reflections;
- Apply experiential learning approaches and methods that underpin various Strand 4 courses, such as mindfulness, role-playing, games, and field practice;
- Examples of Strand 4 disciplines: positive psychology, positive education, and their connections with health and physical education, language education, music, information technology, ethics and life education, literature and culture, and religion.

# GENERAL EDUCATION CONSOLIDATION COURSE

The General Education Consolidation Course is a 3-credit point "capstone" course which requires students approaching the end of their undergraduate studies both to reflect critically on their undergraduate study experiences - within General Education, in their disciplinary, professional, co-curricular studies, positive and values education, and in their lives beyond the classroom - and to develop an integrated view of how and where they position themselves in relation to their future goals, plans, and aspirations. Students will prepare and submit annotated ePortfolios based on their experiences, reflections and stored artefacts from their undergraduate studies. The course will enable students to recap on and synthesize their undergraduate learning experiences, by examining what they understand about critical thinking and how they apply critical thinking. In the course delivery, students will reflect critically on what and why they cannot learn at a specific point in their undergraduate studies, with hindsight on the situations whereby they can improve and search for ways/ strategies for future improvement. This selfreview and reflection will empower students with the capability of making sense/ meaning of what they have learned, making connections to their lives, and imagining their own futures.

Students are allowed to take the General Education Consolidation Course after completion of all General Education Breadth Courses required or concurrently with the fourth (i.e. last) General Education Breadth Course. Also, they have to take the General Education Consolidation Course in the year of study assigned by individual programmes. However, students are not allowed to take the GECC together with any exchange programmes, block practices, field experiences or internship programmes. Students can opt for **ONE** General Education Consolidation Course (from a set of elective courses listed on p.41) to be their 3-credit point "capstone" course. All General Education Consolidation Courses will comprise the following Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILOs). The GECC course registration is conducted on first-come-first-served basis with limited quota. Students may need to choose another GECC if their preferred course is over-enrolled. After the online course registration period, any add/drop for the GECC is not allowed due to the course nature and tight schedule.

**Please note that** GEO reserves the right to reshuffle the enrollment of GECC if there is an imbalance in grouping that might lead to exceptionally heavy workload of supervisors.

# **Course Intended Learning Outcomes** (CILOs)

By the end of the General Education Consolidation Course, students will be able to:

- CILO1 Communicate (orally and in writing) personally, reflectively and critically about their undergraduate journey (including, but not restricted to, GE), utilizing the University structures of the 4Cs Learning Framework and Generic Intended Learning Outcomes, in particular Critical Thinking Skills, the GE Learning Outcomes (GELOs) and GE Criteria;
- CILO2 Make, and reflect critically on, connections between what they have learned in their undergraduate studies and specific aspects of their own lives and experiences beyond the classroom;
- **CILO3** Articulate their own beliefs, values and goals in order to describe a personal description or vision for living a worthwhile life.

#### **Course Structure and Assessment**

The General Education Consolidation Course will comprise several class meetings and consultations, but will also involve students working independently and in small work teams. Students will attend 4-5 two-hour class meetings at the beginning of the course to acquire and practise critical thinking and writing skills, and engage in interactive reflective sharing and discussion. Divided into peer study groups, students will then meet with their course supervisors and fellow group-members (as *critical friends*) in consultation sessions for reflective writing and preparing their individual ePortfolios. Students' reflective entries, individual presentations and ePortfolios will all be assessed.
