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GENERAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM

General Education, as a programme of study, aims to provide students with a foundation in acquiring knowledge, skills, values, and mind-set to equip them for the challenges of university studies and beyond. It also serves as preparation for academic pursuit in a specialized area of study at the undergraduate or graduate levels. These preparations include analytical, critical, and creative thinking, as well as the motivation to learn and an open-mind to explore new concepts, beliefs, and knowledge. At EdUHK, the General Education programme offers a variety of courses with a broad range of subject areas and disciplines, set within an integrated structure of General Education Foundation Course, General Education Breadth Courses, Experiential Learning and University ePortfolio.

Students are strongly encouraged to visit the website for more details of the General Education programme, the variety of courses, and their corresponding learning outcomes. It is also recommended that students should be familiarized with the



General Education Learning Outcomes (GELOs). These outcomes stipulate the overall objectives of the General Education programme across students' entire study at EdUHK.






General Education Learning Outcomes (GELOs)

At the end of the General Education programme, students will be able to:

GELO 1 Knowledge	Demonstrate an understanding of how knowledge is acquired within and across different disciplinary domains, and how it applies to aspects of their own lives and experiences as a future professional and citizen;
GELO 2 Application	Apply a broad range of attitudes and skills, including those relating to the seven GILOs, different kinds of thinking and communication, to inquire into various academic and practical issues;
GELO 3 Judgements	Make good judgements and ethical decisions, based on values and standards which are sensible and reasonable;
GELO 4 Expression	Express their own ideas clearly and confidently after critically inquiring into and reflecting on various theories, perspectives, stances and experiences;
GELO 5 Awareness	Show that they are aware of local, regional and global issues, and construct informed and thoughtful responses to these issues;
GELO 6 Engagement	Demonstrate intellectual and civic engagement through active participation in and reflection on various co-curricular, service, and experiential learning activities.

General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3) (GELS) and Positive and Values Education (PAVE) Courses



-  3+3 credit points

- points) and one PAVE Course (3 credit points)
- Normally to be taken upon the completion of the GEFC
 - Students are also allowed to take the GEFC and the GELS/ PAVE Course concurrently in Year 1 Semester 2 if they are interested and their curriculum schedule allows.
 - Year 1 students who have been granted credit transfer for the GEFC (due to change of programme within EdUHK) can start taking GELS/ PAVE Course in Year 1 Semester 1.

General Education Interdisciplinary Courses (GEICs)




-  3 credit points
-  Compulsory
-  To be taken in Year 2 Semester 2 to Year 3 Semester 1
-  To be taken after completion of any GELS or PAVE Course. (No pre-requisite for Senior Year Entrants)
-  Medium of Instruction: English

Experiential Learning



-  6 credit points
-  1 Co-curricular and Service Learning Course (3 credit points) and 1 Experiential Learning Course (3 credit points)

-  Students are allowed to take courses in Experiential Learning starting from Year 1, both courses should be completed before final year.
-  Unless specified by individual hosting departments, courses contained in the course offering list are open for students' selection provided there is no time clash with other registered courses.
-  Medium of Instruction: English/ Chinese

University ePortfolio


-  3 credit points
-  Compulsory
-  Medium of Instruction: English

Non-Senior Year Entrants:

-  To be taken after completion of all General Education Breadth Courses required
-  Students have to take the University ePortfolio course in the study semester assigned by individual programmes as follows^:

BEd/DD programmes:	Year 4 Semester 1
Non-BEd programmes:	Year 3 Semester 2 (For Senior Year Entrants, please refer to the following section.)

Senior Year Entrants:

 Students have to take the specific University ePortfolio course assigned to Senior Year Entrants (i.e. GEJ4020 “Consolidating Undergraduate Learning through University ePortfolio”) in Year 4 Semester 1, which is the study semester assigned by individual programmes[^].

[^] The UePortfolio study semester of some programmes may differ from the assigned semesters listed in this booklet. Please check with your programme office if you have any questions about your programme structure.

Remarks:

i) Students have to keep all learning artefacts/ documents/ records for the construction of University ePortfolios throughout their undergraduate studies.

ii) Individual programmes may have different requirements on study sequence and individual GE course pre-requisite(s). Students are advised to check with their programme offices before course registration.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENT FOR GENERAL EDUCATION COURSES

Students are expected to follow the General Academic Regulations and to attend every scheduled session of a course. Unless otherwise specified by individual courses/ lecturers/ departments, **the minimum attendance requirement across the General Education courses is 80%**. Under special circumstances, students who are absent from a prolonged period, or for more than the 20% of contact time allowed must seek approval from the Course Instructor and Programme Leader/ Coordinator prior to taking the leave. Students who are absent from a prolonged period in a course without prior permission will be given a grade F (Fail) by their course lecturers/ tutors. The grade F will be recorded on the students' transcripts.



Attendance Policy for the General Education Foundation Course

Students are required to attend both lectures and tutorials. Students' attendance in lectures would be recorded electronically via their student ID cards. For the tutorials, tutors would monitor the attendance and students would be penalized


in the final grade for poor attendance. Students should contact their tutors if they are absent from any tutorials.

If students are not able to attend any lecture/ tutorial due to the following circumstances, they are required to submit a Leave Application Form to GE Office/ their tutors.

1. Taking General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3)/ Positive and Values Education Course(s)/ Experiential Learning as Elective(s)

According to the University's policy, all 4-year FT BA/ BSocSc/ BME/ BScEd/ BSocScEd and 5-year FT BEds students are eligible to select the General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3) (GEF, GEG, GEH)/ Positive and Values Education Course(s) (GEK)/ Experiential Learning as elective(s).

Students who wish to register extra General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3) (GEF, GEG, GEH)/ Positive and Values Education Course(s) (GEK)/ Experiential Learning as elective(s) or free choice(s) should contact and notify their Programme Offices after successful registration of the course(s).

Remarks:

For Experiential Learning, students are allowed to take only one additional Co-curricular and Service Learning Course (GEM) or Experiential Learning Course (GEL) as elective.

2. Drop or Withdraw General Education Breadth Courses/ Experiential Learning after the Add/ Drop Period

According to the General Academic Regulations of the Student Handbook *Chapter 4.1*


(https://www.eduhk.hk/re/student_handbook/main.html),

Point 4. Course Enrolment

“4.3 Students can add or drop a course during the add-drop period or before the third class meeting. Students are permitted to drop a course after the add-drop period but before the examination period or the deadline for submission of final assignments, whichever applicable, only for strong personal reasons, such as serious illnesses; the grade W (Withdrawn) will be recorded on the students' transcript.”

and

“4.4 Failure to attend a course does not automatically result in the course being dropped. Students who are reported for prolonged absence in a course without permission will be accorded a grade F (Fail) for the course (as stipulated in 13.2).”



According to the regulations, **adding or dropping any General Education Breadth Course/ courses in Experiential Learning after the add/ drop period will NOT be allowed.** Students are permitted to withdraw the course after the add/ drop period (before the examination period) only if they have strong personal reasons. These reasons include serious illnesses or other special reasons indicating that the students are unable to continue their study for a prolonged period. In this case, students are also required to get the approval from the Course Instructor and Programme Leader/ Coordinator by email or application form (if applicable). The grade W (Withdrawn) will be recorded on the transcripts for successful applicants. For any student who is reported for prolonged absence without any strong personal reason, a grade F (Fail) will be accorded for the course.

To maintain fairness and consistency in practice, General Education Office will strictly follow the above regulations and no special approval will be given to students without strong personal reasons as stated in the Student Handbook. As a friendly reminder, please also note that there is NO paper form for adding or dropping the General Education Breadth Courses and courses in Experiential Learning (except for summer semester). Students **MUST** add or drop the General Education Breadth Courses and courses in Experiential Learning through the online platform during add/ drop period.




PLAGIARISM

According to the Academic Honesty and Copyright of the Student Handbook *Chapter 8* (https://www.eduhk.hk/re/student_handbook/main.html),

Point 4. Plagiarism

“This is not just confined to copying another's words, sentences and/or paragraphs, but also means borrowing another's idea, concept or argument without proper acknowledgment. It is a serious academic offence in the intellectual world as it stifles creativity and originality, whilst denying you the opportunity of learning from your work. There is zero tolerance for plagiarism at any level at the University as clearly spelt out in the Policy. Even if you just copy a phrase or sentence, or borrow an idea and/or concept without proper referencing, you have already committed plagiarism, an academic theft similar to stealing. You should avoid it at all costs. Also, it does not matter what the nature of the source is. It may be a book, a magazine, a newspaper article, a table or passage from the internet, or simply a course work of another student or even teaching material distributed by your course teachers.

The most obvious form of plagiarism is direct copying without referencing. Modifying the way the author expresses his idea and passing this off as your own, that is, paraphrasing the



author's idea, is another form of plagiarism though it is less explicit. Students, however, often fall prey to this form of plagiarism. Other forms may include borrowing the work of others by attaching one's name to it or the indirect borrowing of work from a secondary source cited in the original source without properly acknowledging both sources. The following example may help you to grasp the meaning more thoroughly:

In Hong Kong, women are expected to live longer than men.

(This fact has been widely known to Hong Kong people, so it is already common knowledge and there is no need to acknowledge the source.)

In Hong Kong, women outlive men. According to the statistics of the Centre for Health Protection in 2018, the average life expectancy of women is 87.7 years while that for men is only 82.3 years.

(When we give exact figures, unless you are the source provider, you have to acknowledge the source. If you don't do so, you commit plagiarism!)”



GENERAL EDUCATION FOUNDATION COURSE (Course Code: GEE)

General Education Foundation Course is a 4-credit course that will run for the whole academic year, and be taken by all first-year students at EdUHK. This course will equip students with the diverse knowledge bases and skills for their intellectual and professional developments in local, national and global contexts. In Semester 1, there will be a series of lectures and/or workshops on selected themes and topics (e.g. University life planning, research and inquiry, Basic Law, national security, professionalism, ethics etc.). In Semester 2, students will be introduced to a wide variety of themes and issues in general education (e.g. language, well-being, entrepreneurship, artificial intelligence, conservation, globalization etc.) by taking part in the lectures delivered by Chair Professors / Professors and external Guest Lecturers. These lectures are substantiated by small class tutorials for building communities of dialogue and inquiry that foster the intellectual growth of students as reflective thinkers deliberating issues of importance to their own lives, society and the world as a whole.



In addition to the face-to-face lectures, video lectures will be arranged as appropriate to allow students to learn flexibly at their own paces. As a unique feature of the course, e-Learning assessments and a reflective entry of their learning experiences will be submitted by students after lectures and become an important part of the e-Portfolio. The online learning activities and tasks will encourage students to reflect and think critically on various themes and issues based on learning artefacts and experiences, thereby, charting the paths for their personal, intellectual and professional developments.



Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILOs)

By the end of the General Education Foundation Course, students will be able to:

CILO 1 Demonstrate appropriate levels of understanding and knowledge in a range of disciplines and subject areas;

CILO 2 Demonstrate an understanding of what knowledge is, and how knowledge is learned and communicated, across different disciplines and subject areas;

CILO 3 Demonstrate a commitment to thinking, speaking and writing critically about a range of views and ideas;

CILO 4 Reflect critically on and make meaningful connections between the course content and their own beliefs, values and goals, based on moral and reasoned judgements.




THE STRUCTURE OF THE GENERAL EDUCATION FOUNDATION COURSE

Classes of the General Education Foundation Course will be composed of weekly face-to-face/ video lectures and tutorials.

The General Education Foundation Course lectures (in Semester 1 and 2) (1.5 hours per week)

The lectures will be given by eminent scholars and practitioners who will introduce students to a range of disciplines and topics across different knowledge domains. In addition to face-to-face lectures, video lectures will be arranged as appropriate. For the video lecture weeks, students will not be required to attend the face-to-face lectures and tutorials. Instead, students are strongly encouraged to watch video(s), read supplementary resources, complete online assessment tasks and take part in online discussion forums which are based on the suggested inquiry questions.



The General Education Foundation Course tutorials* **(in Semester 2 only) (1.5 hours per week)**

The tutorials will be small-class environments in which students sharpen their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills, and learn to think critically about the issues presented in the lectures. These activities will enable students to develop a deeper understanding of the course content, and to construct and reflect on their own interpretations of that content. Students interact with tutors on a regular basis and they will be trained to improve their communication skills and nurture tolerant, critical but constructive attitudes towards various academic arguments and debates.

Remarks:

**The General Education Foundation Course tutorials will be held on Tai Po Campus and at Tseung Kwan O Study Centre. Students have to attend tutorials at one of the locations as assigned.*

GENERAL EDUCATION BREADTH COURSES

From cohort 2019/20 onwards, General Education Breadth Courses (GEBCs) (9 credit points) are composed of General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3) (GELS) (Level 1-2), Positive and Values Education (PAVE) Courses and General Education Interdisciplinary Courses (GEICs) (Level 4). Students have to take one from each component for fulfilling the GEBCs (9 credit points) requirement.

1) General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3) (GELS)

General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3) (GELS) extend students' intellectual perspectives by inviting them to explore more focused topics across major fields of knowledge; specifically: arts and humanities, social sciences and science and technology. They are categorized into three strands, namely,

Strand 1	(Course Code: GEF) Persons, Interpretations, Perspectives
Strand 2	(Course Code: GEG) Community, Society, Culture
Strand 3	(Course Code: GEH) Nature, Science, Technology



2) Positive and Values Education (PAVE) Courses

(Course Code: GEK)

Positive and Values Education (PAVE) Courses aim at generating students' understandings on enhancing individual and collective well-being through self-reflections.

Students will have to take one course from the General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3) and one Positive and Values Education (PAVE) Course. The GELS and PAVE Courses are normally taken upon the completion of the General Education Foundation Course (GEFC). Students are also allowed to take the GEFC and the GELS/ PAVE Course concurrently in Year 1 Semester 2 if they are interested and their curriculum schedule allows.

3) General Education Interdisciplinary Courses (GEICs)

(Course Code: GEI)

In addition, a 3-credit point General Education Interdisciplinary Course (Level 4) will be offered on cross-faculty basis for students from Year 2 Semester 2 to Year 3 Semester 1, in order to enable them to appreciate the complexity of issues and problems that transcend disciplinary boundaries and to make sense of them through dialogues across disciplines. The GEIC is normally taken after the completion of any GELS or PAVE Course (No pre-requisite for Senior Year Entrants).


1) General Education Breadth Learning Strands (1-3)

Strand 1 (Course Code: GEF): Persons, Interpretations, Perspectives

Course synopsis

- Focus on human persons as individuals;
- Aim at generating new understandings and interpretations, often of a personal or narrative nature, rather than the impersonal accumulation of factual and theoretical knowledge;
- Use more particularistic and accessible methods, such as literary analysis and criticism, case studies, semantics and conceptual analysis relating to specific individuals, events and situations;
- More concerned with specifics (individuality) than patterns or generality;
- Embrace issues to do with values and evaluation.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Experiential Learning consists of Co-curricular and Service Learning Courses and Experiential Learning Courses. Co-curricular and Service Learning Courses provide students with an opportunity to engage in learning in action and through action in real-life or work-place context while complementing, connecting with, and mirroring their learning experiences derived from formal curriculum. On the other hand, Experiential Learning Courses encourage students to learn through experimentation, observation, reflection and (re-)conceptualization while undertaking a wide variety of activities, such as creative work, student-initiated enterprises/projects, thematic overseas trips, outward-bound training, etc.

Students will have to take one Co-curricular and Service Learning Course (Course code: GEM) and one Experiential Learning Course (Course code: GEL) starting from Year 1 (3 credit points each). For BEd students, they should complete the EL courses before Year 5 Semester 2 (However, BEd students are suggested to complete EL courses before Semester 1 of the final year as they will be engaged in BP II and data collection/ fieldwork of FYP in this Semester. Careful academic planning on a personal basis is




needed). For non-BEd students, EL courses should be completed before the final year.

UNIVERSITY ePORTFOLIO (Course Code: GEJ)

University ePortfolio is a 3-credit point "capstone" course which requires students approaching the end of their undergraduate studies both to reflect critically on their undergraduate study experiences - within General Education, in their disciplinary, professional, co-curricular studies, positive and values education, and in their lives beyond the classroom - and to develop an integrated view of how and where they position themselves in relation to their future goals, plans, and aspirations. Students will prepare and submit annotated ePortfolios based on their experiences, reflections and stored artefacts from their undergraduate studies. The course will enable students to recap on and synthesise their undergraduate learning experiences, by examining what they understand about critical thinking and how they apply critical thinking. In the course delivery, students will reflect critically on undergraduate studies, with hindsight on the situations whereby they can improve and search for ways/strategies for future improvement. This self-review and reflection will empower students with the capability of making



sense/ meaning of what they have learned, making connections to their lives, and imagining their own futures.

Course pre-requisites

For Non-Senior Year Entrants:

Students are allowed to take the University ePortfolio course after completion of all General Education Breadth Courses required (i.e. General Education Breadth Learning Strands, Positive and Values Education Courses, General Education Interdisciplinary Courses)¹. Also, they have to take the University ePortfolio course in the study semester assigned by individual programmes. Students can opt for one University ePortfolio course (from a set of courses listed on p.49) to be their 3-credit point “capstone” course.

¹ Students from Co-terminal Double Degree programmes are not required to complete GE Breadth Learning Strands before taking the University ePortfolio course. For details of programme structure, please consult individual Programme Office.



For Senior Year Entrants:

There are no course pre-requisites for Senior Year Entrants. However, they must register for one of the UePortfolio groups (i.e. GEJ4020 “Consolidating Undergraduate Learning through University ePortfolio”²) assigned to Senior Year Entrants for the study semester assigned by their individual programmes. Before the Online Course Registration (CR) Period, GEO will inform eligible students the details of these specific GEJ4020 groups, including their CRNs, that they can enroll into during the Online CR Period.

² Specific GEJ4020 groups would be open only to Senior Year Entrants for registration.



Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILOs)

By the end of the University ePortfolio course, students will be able to:

CILO1 Communicate (orally and in writing) personally, reflectively and critically about their undergraduate experiences (including, but not restricted to, GE), utilizing the University structures of the Learning Framework drawing on Graduate Attributes, i.e. PEER & I, and GILOs, in particular Critical Thinking and Communication Skills, the GE Learning Outcomes (GELOs);

CILO2 Make, and reflect critically on, connections between what they have learned in their undergraduate studies and specific aspects of their own lives and experiences beyond the classroom;

CILO3 Articulate their own beliefs, values and goals in line with directions of developing into a person who can display professional excellence, think critically to make moral judgements, learn and engage in lifelong learning and live a worthwhile life.



Course Structure and Assessment


The University ePortfolio course will comprise several class meetings and consultations, but will also involve students working independently and in small work teams. Students will attend 4-5 two-hour class meetings at the beginning of the course to acquire and practise critical thinking and writing skills, and engage in interactive reflective sharing and discussion. Divided into peer study groups, students will then meet with their course supervisors and fellow group-members (as *critical friends*) in consultation sessions for reflective writing and preparing their individual University ePortfolios. The course assessments include Reflective Entry, Individual Presentation, and Individual University ePortfolio.
